By his sacrifice, their could be forgiven (2:38)
They could be of God's redeemed people (2:39-41)
The only reasonable response was(2:42-43)
The words of Jude 24-25 perfectly capture the "great" that filled their hearts
Put natica thair haarte ware also "ganarous"
But notice, their hearts were also "generous." Can also be translated "," "simplicity," or ",
the opposite of the "double-mindedness" James warns us about (1:5-8; 4:4-8).
Gladness in God produced a spirit of open-handedness and liberality toward others (2:44-45; 4:32-35).
Generous in(4:36-37)
Generous in sharing the reason for their(8:1-4; 1 Pet 3:8-17)
What about <i>my</i> heart?
Is my heart "glad"? If I know something's missing, what do I?
If Acts teaches us anything, it most certainly points out the importance of my heart (1:24; 2:37; 5:3-4; 7:39; 8:21-22; 14:15-17; 15:8-9; 16:14; 28:27)
