## For Class & Family Discussion:

•	Why wouldn't the LORD just leave the people alone and let them do what they wanted to do? Why do you think the LORD felt the need to "contend with Israel" (Mic 6:1-2)?
•	Why do you think Jeremiah described idols as "worthless, a work of delusion" (51:18)?
•	Let's turn our Bibles back to Isaiah 44:12-20 and read it together. What stands out to you from this sad description of how much God's people had forgotten and how far they had wandered away from him?
•	Let's turn our Bibles back to 1 John 5:21—the very last verse in 1 John—and read it together. Why do you think John would write that to Christians, many years after those kings of Israel and Judah who made such a mess of things?
•	Do we still struggle with idolatry today? If so, in your own words, what <i>is</i> an idol? What sort of idols might be very dangerous for us, even today?
•	Notice how the apostle Paul contrasts idols with God in 1 Thessalonians 1:9-10. What makes God different? What has God done that an idol cannot do?
•	Why do you think God would describe himself in Exodus 20:5 as "a jealous God"? We usually think of jealousy as a bad thing, so can it somehow be a good thing? If so, in what way?
•	We heard the prophet Zechariah describing God's people as "wandering like sheep" and being "afflicted for lack of a shepherd" (10:2). How does idolatry make people "wander" and lose their connection to God as the good "shepherd"?
