Husbands, love your wives, as Christ \_\_\_\_\_\_ the church and gave himself up for

her, that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, so that he might present the church to \_\_\_\_\_\_ in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish.

**	"having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word" -
**	"so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle" -
	right, but <b>WHEN?</b> When is Christ going to "present the church to himself in splendor"? hat can we learn from these passages?  For I feel a divine for you, since I you to one
	husband, to present you as a pure virgin to Christ. (2 Cor 11:2)
	And you, who once were alienated and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his body of flesh by his death, in order to you holy and blameless and above reproach before him, indeed you continue in the faith, stable and steadfast, not shifting from the hope of the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed in all creation under heaven, and of which I, Paul, became a minister. (Col 1:21-23)
	Then I heard what seemed to be the voice of a great multitude, like the roar of many waters and like the sound of mighty peals of thunder, crying out,
	"Hallelujah! For the Lord our God the Almighty reigns.  Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory, for the of the Lamb has come, and his Bride has made herself ready; it was granted her to clothe herself with fine linen, bright and pure"—
	for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the (Rev 19:6-8)
	He who testifies to these things says, "Surely I am" Amen. Come, Lord Jesus! (Rev 22:20)
**	The God of promises and covenants has had an "eternal purpose" all along that has been "realized in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Eph 3:11). Passages like 1 Thessalonians 4:13-5:11 and 2 Peter 3:1-13 emphasize that Jesus is going to return for his bride. So how is God's great plan ultimately going to reach its conclusion? And what do we need to be doing in the meantime?
